This will open a list of data layers.

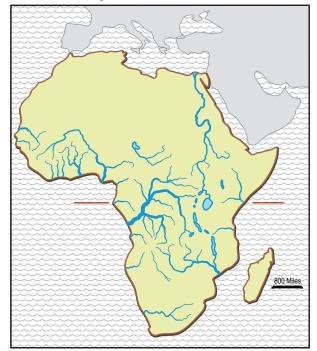
- ♦ Click any button to make that data layer visible. The button will turn darker.
- ◆ Click on a darkened button to make that layer invisible.
- ◆ Click "Clear Map" to reset the map to the way it was when you opened the file.

If you are using a printable .pdf file:

Click on the icon that looks like a short stack of pages.



- Clicking on an empty box will make that data layer visible.
- Clicking on a checked box will make that layer invisible.



- 1. Click the blue buttons to show the rivers, river names, and ocean names. Circle the names of the rivers that drain into the Atlantic Ocean:

 Circle: Congo Niger Nile Orange Zambezi
- 2. The Nile River is one of the longest rivers in the world. Find the data layers that show rainfall in different seasons. Click to turn them on and off in any order you want. When do you think the Nile is most likely to flood? Circle: August December March Write one sentence to explain why floods would happen in that time of year:
- 3. Millet is a nutritious grain (like wheat). People can use it to make soup, cereal, and bread. It was a key part of the diet of people in many important empires in African history. What kind of animal are you most likely to see in the areas of Africa where millet seems to grow best? Circle: chimpanzee cheetah camel
- 4. An ecoregion is a large area that has a particular mixture of plants and animals. In what ecoregion are you most likely to see elephants?

 Circle: chaparral desert grassland savanna rainforest
- 5. Islam in Africa was spread mainly by traders. What animal was most likely used by Islamic traders to carry their goods? Circle: camel chimpanzee elephant
- 6. Find the data layers that show **fires** in different seasons. Compare them with other layers. Write a short paragraph to explain the relationship between fires and rainfall.

Africa Clickable Map Investigation
